

Stored in the archives at the Museum are three photo albums full of photos. While many of the photos have names and dates, the name of the original owner had been lost. By looking at the photos, we were pretty sure the owner was a young woman who worked in the Litchfield schools. We decided she probably wasn't a teacher, because the students photographed were from all ages.

The mystery was finally solved when we came across a scrapbook that belonged to Edith Lake. Miss Lake was the school nurse for Litchfield in the mid-1930s until 1940. Her

Township Tales Darwin & Elsworth Darwin, Minnesota c 1917

Come along as we continue our Township Tales series, featuring stories from Meeker County townships. This issue includes Darwin and Ellsworth Townships.

Darwin Township

For many people, when they hear "Darwin" thoughts turn to the Twine Ball, but there is another "ball" that has a place in Darwin's history—baseball.

One of Darwin's baseball highlights comes from September 1921 when the Miller brothers from Darwin faced off against the Litchfield team. At the close of Litchfield's regular season, the Miller brothers decided to challenge the team to a special game.

John and Catherine Miller had thirteen children—ten boys and three girls. The patriarch John was a great ballplayer himself. John once struck out 24 batters in a single game and is said to have thrown a ball from Litchfield's Sibley Avenue, across Central Park, and into the front door of the G.A.R. Hall. It's no wonder the Miller boys grew up with the game. Sadly, John died two years before the celebrated Miller brothers vs. Litchfield game.

The game began at 2:00 on Sunday,

September 18, 1921. About 750 people attended, a great crowd despite some concern over the weather.

The Millers' lineup included eight of the brothers, plus one Mr.



Alexander who was brought in to play the catcher position. Howard Miller, the youngest brother, didn't play and brother Raymond was in uniform but didn't appear in the game's box score.

As for the Litchfield team, their season hadn't gone as well as they had hoped, so they brought in outside players from Hutchinson and Dassel to bolster their lineup.

The game was a close one. Some of the Miller brothers were a bit out of practice and had some fielding errors, but brother Joe pitched well, striking out 17 batters. Litchfield threatened to score in the bottom of the ninth, but the Miller brothers hung on for a 4 to 3 victory.

Another highlight in Darwin's baseball history was the 1936 Darwin team. The team was part of the Wright County League. They had been part of the Meeker County League in previous years, but the league had added a rule that the whole team had to be local, which wasn't the case for all of Darwin's players. One of the Darwin boys was Earl Miller of the Miller brothers team.

Despite winning only half of their regular season games, the 1936 Darwin team would go on to win the Wright County League championship, earning them a spot in the State Amateur Baseball Championship at Lexington Park in St. Paul.

The Darwin team represented one of the smallest towns to have ever reached the state tournament, but one wouldn't have known it by the number of fans at the games. The *Meeker County News* reported that the fans outnumbered the population of Darwin. A caravan of forty or more cars left from Darwin, with a bus and more cars joining in Dassel and eastward.

The team played well, winning their first three games and advancing to the championship game against Windom. Unfortunately for the team, their semi-final game had originally been scheduled for Saturday, but rain forced the team to play the game Sunday morning before the championship game that evening. The Windom team proved too tough for the tired Darwin team and they lost 1 to 3.

Ellsworth Township

For many of the farmers in Meeker County's first couple of decades, their focus was on their crops, mostly corn, wheat, and other grains. When it came to livestock, the 1870s agricultural schedule shows the average farm had one to two dozen animals —perhaps a couple of horses, some milk cows, a team of oxen, and maybe a few sheep or pigs. But the livestock owned by Ellsworth Township's John Duckering is another story.

For those whose ancestors were farmers in the 1870s, the agricultural schedule is a great source of information. It gives land amounts, livestock, and crops raised along with values. The total value of Duckering's farm was \$4,000. Only one other farm in the township was valued higher. The Duckering farm had three milk cows, two oxen, four pigs, seventeen horses, and 215 sheep. In comparing his horses and sheep, there wasn't a farm in the entire county that had a higher number. Duckering had three times as many sheep as found in all of Ellsworth Township combined.

Not only did Duckering have a large number of animals, but the animals themselves were often large and made prize-winning appearances at the local fairs. In 1871, he presented a 1,000-pound pig and a 1,450-pound stallion in 1873.

Some of the breeds Duckering raised included White Chester pigs; Merino and Cotswold sheep; and Durham and Shorthorn cattle. His horses included Norman and English

Shire. Shire horses were large, working horses. According to an 1888 Meeker County history, Duckering owned one of only two Shire horses in the whole county, and it was said to be one of the finest in all of Minnesota.

The Duckerings' farm was kept busy with more than just livestock. The 1870 schedule shows the farm produced wheat, Indian corn, barley, oats, potatoes, and hay. There was also 300 pounds of butter, 260 gallons of molasses, and, not surprisingly, 700 pounds of wool.

But Duckering didn't stop there. In 1872, he planted eighty apple trees and was harvesting 100 bushels within three years. He also raised turkeys and won prizes for his pumpkins, squash, honey, popcorn, and apples.

1874 ad from the *Litchfield Ledger*

John Duckering was born in England in 1819, came to the United States in 1842, and settled in Ellsworth Township in 1865. John and his wife Marie (Bean) had twelve children, and it is safe to

assume the whole family shared in the success of the family farm.

In 1886, Duckering sold much of his livestock, valued around \$1,500. Within a few years, he and his wife had sold their Ellsworth farm and divided their time between Kimball and Hutchinson. In 1906, the couple followed some of their children west, residing in Washington. John died in 1909 at the age of 89. His wife, Maria, died the following year. Despite not having lived in the area for several years, a lengthy obituary for John appeared in Litchfield's Independent Review where he was remembered as being a "lover of good horses and fine stock" and for his "bluff, outspoken and honest personality."
